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


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# Condemic EXCELLENCE

Then Nancy began to recollect her childhood. She remembered playing with her big family full of cousins: "I used to build things like kites with chopsticks and newspapers, and I also used to boss them around a lot and try to teach them," she remembers.

Eventually, Nancy allowed that same pursuit of joyful play and hands-on learning to bring her to teaching—which opened the door to 10 wonderful years as part of the faculty at Josephinum Academy.

"For me," Nancy says, "it's been amazing, just because I feel like the students here are really authentic."


Nancy also loves being part of such a dynamic and intelligent team of educators at The Jo. "We're not just teachers—we're experts in our field[s]," Nancy says.

## MONIQUE NORINGTON-JOSEPH BRINGS VIBRANT OPPORTUNITIES TO THE JO

When Monique Norington-Joseph's grandparents told her where she would be attending high school, she was not thrilled, to say the least.

"I found out that it was an all-girls school—I don't think I talked to them for like six months," she recollects, laughing.

Now serving as The Jo's Director of Student Life and Partnerships, Monique, Class of 1992, has returned to her alma mater with a different perspective. "It ended up being the best opportunity that shaped and directed my life," she says.

Born to a teen mom and raised by her grandparents on the West Side of Chicago, Monique developed new perspectives and values at Josephinum Academy.

She credits the Sisters of Christian Charity, who directed her Catholic education, with first teaching her the importance of academics and social justice. The former, she asserts, is the reason she attended the University of Illinois and later earned a masters degree from DePaul University. The latter developed her compassion.

Monique launched her career in corporate branding and marketing, then started her own business, became



a mom, and wrote several children's books. Then, she decided it was time for her life to pivot again. Monique moved back to Illinois in June 2021 and was recruited to apply for a position at The Jo.

"I said, 'This is an opportunity for me to pay it forward and love "my" school.' I always attribute a lot of my passion to my foundation at Josephinum."

Today, much of her work revolves around community partnerships and student leadership. But she also enjoys teaching students life skills—like the power of networking and how to make the most of their own Josephinum experiences.

"I understand these young women because I was once in their shoes walking these same halls. I believe in the power of education and Josephinum is the pathway to a very bright future. I know what is possible with a Josephinum education."

# SISTERS HERU AND LYDIA SHARE THEIR STORY AS REFUGEES

In 2011, the simmering conflict between Eritrea and Ethiopia flared up once again with a series of incidents along their shared border. The onset of violence prompted thousands of families—including sisters Heru and Lydia—to pack their things and seek safety in Ethiopia.

Although their maternal grandmother had ties to Ethiopia, their family only had citizenship in Eritrea. Given that the political conflict created mistrust between the two nations, the family was surprised at how warmly they were received. "The Tigray people were very generous, very awesome people," Heru explains. "They opened their houses to Eritrean people. Even though we were still in conflict and we never lived with each other, they still opened their doors for us." The girls called the refugee camp where they lived "a little city" decked out with cafes and amenities for the displaced community. And for almost six years, this little city was their home.

Then Heru and Lydia's family received word that they were moving to Chicago.

The moves, first from Eritrea to Ethiopia, and then from Ethiopia to America, each posed unique challenges. In Ethiopia, the girls had to get used to walking long distances for water that was once available by tap. But during the move to America, the biggest challenge was cultural integration.

In 8th grade, Lydia's teacher observed how shy she was in the face of so many adjustments, so she recommended that Lydia consider Josephinum Academy of the Sacred Heart for high school. It seemed like a great fit for her—a diverse student body, small class sizes, and lots of opportunities to grow.

At The Jo, her confidence and comfort blossomed. She loved her Spanish and computer science classes, and she enjoyed making friends while playing sports like badminton. When it was Heru's turn to attend high school, she followed her sister to The Jo.

Heru found her own passions playing volleyball and in math class. "When it comes to English, it's all about how you see things," she explains. "But with math, everybody comes up with the same answer."

According to Heru, the best part of Josephinum is "the connection...Every time [people] talk about Josephinum—that's what they talk about."

And it's not just a connection between students. Teachers are invested, too—paying attention to students' personal and academic interests.

"They want you to learn, but at the same time they care about how you are personally," she explains.

For Lydia, her academic dreams have been inspired by the people she misses in Eritrea—including her late landlady and close friend.

"She used to work in a hospital. She's like my favorite person in the world. I used to call her my grandma for like nine to ten years—she was so fun and humble."

Now Lydia is following in her footsteps. She graduated from Josephinum Academy in 2022 and is attending Aurora University's nursing program, with plans to help those around her—just like all the people who helped her along the way.

Heru is excited for her future, too. This summer, she participated in the Project Bright Hour summer internship—an incredible opportunity to build her skills and add professional experience to her resume. Now, she is looking forward to even more opportunities during her last two years at Josephinum Academy.
