Josephinum Academy of the Sacred Heart is proud to announce its official authorization as an International Baccalaureate (IB) World School! With this accreditation, Josephinum becomes the first all-girls school in Chicago to offer a wall-to-wall International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme. Traditionally, Chicago high schools offer very selective Diploma Programmes, akin to Advanced Placement courses. By offering a wall-to-wall IB program, Josephinum continues to embrace its tradition of extending the boundaries of educational opportunity and strengthens its commitment to providing a well-rounded,

quality education to all of our students.

As a Sacred Heart school, Josephinum aims to develop holistic young women who not only strive for academic excellence, but who are also committed to personal growth, and impelled to act against injustice and oppression. In the same regard, at the heart of the IB Organization's mission is the desire to develop global, critical, and principled thinkers who will help create a more peaceful world. For both Josephinum Academy and the IB Organization, developing one's intellect without fostering a critical consciousness is simply not enough. Josephinum and the IB program both

understand that it is what one does with her education that truly matters and it is what one contributes to the world that makes a difference.

In addition to aligning beautifully with Josephinum's mission, the IB Diploma Programme is designed to meet the needs of the 21st century learner. Thanks to modern advances in technology, our students live in an incredibly innovative, interconnected, and global world. Through the IB curriculum, Josephinum students will be challenged to become independent researchers, critical consumers of information, and effective communicators. Furthermore, they will be called to evaluate multiple perspectives and gain a deeper understanding of complex world issues, growing into responsible global citizens.
